Certification Description

The Washington Department of Health (DOH) established the Medical Cannabis Consultant Certification to promote the recognition of quality and excellence of service in the state's medical cannabis industry. Green CulturED's approved certification guides aspiring consultants through rigorous levels of training and examinations, culminating in becoming certified by the DOH.

A Medical Cannabis Consultant is responsible for a variety of patient-oriented tasks that also help support the day-to-day licensed retailer operations by interfacing with patients, promoting compliant dispensary operations, and helping manage and maintain workplace. Learners will become knowledgeable about the medical benefits of cannabis, provide product and industry knowledge to patients, and help them find products to meet their individual medical needs.

Primarily, Medical Cannabis Consultants will provide a quality cannabis dispensary to all patients by understanding their medical needs, however, note that they should never provide medical advice. Moreover, consultants will be required in their role to share relevant information to help patients make informed medical cannabis decisions in a licensed Retail Store with a "Medical Endorsement" from the state.

Learning Objectives

This certification will provide Medical Cannabis Consultants with a solid understanding of their role and knowledge of Washington's industry regulations, rules, and laws to ensure accurate information is being communicated with qualifying patients, designated providers, and consumers that they are assisting.

A consultant may only provide services when acting in the capacity of an owner, employee, or volunteer of a retail outlet licensed and holding a medical. A certificate holder may legally and professionally conduct the following after completion:

- Perform regular job duties and business functions including, but not limited to, assisting a customer with the selection of cannabis product and other items sold at the retail outlet.
- Assist a qualifying patient or designated provider with the following:

- Selection of cannabis products and other items sold at the retail outlet that may benefit the qualifying patient's terminal or debilitating medical condition.
- Understanding the risks and benefits of cannabis products and other items sold at the retail outlet.
- Understanding the risks and benefits of methods of administration of cannabis products sold at the retail outlet. Whenever practicable, a certificate holder will encourage methods of administration other than smoking.
- Advice about the safe handling and storage of cannabis products, including strategies to reduce access by minors.
- Instruction and demonstration about proper use and application of cannabis products.
- Processing the medical cannabis authorization form for the purpose of adding the qualifying patient or designated provider to the database.
- When discussing a cannabis product with a qualifying patient or their designated provider, a certificate holder will refer to the product using the cannabinoid profile labeling required by the Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board (WSLCB) in addition to the represented strain name.

Certification Prerequisites

It is strongly recommended that all learners have a significant amount of existing cannabis experience and to become a certified Medical Cannabis Consultant, they must:

- Be twenty-one (21) years of age or older.
- Complete Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) Training (this isn't required to be covered in our twenty (20) hour Medical Cannabis Consultant Certification).
- Print out, complete, and submit by mail or in-person the Washington Department of Health (DOH) application forms, with all requested documentation, an original signature, date, and fee.

Green CulturED reserves the right to request the verification of age, identity, and qualifications of learners along with any other information relevant to participation in our certification.

Certification Requirements

Instruction Time: Twenty (20) Hours Required

Enrollment Duration: Ninety (90) Day Access

The Medical Cannabis Consultant Certification is expected to be completed within ninety (90) days from the enrollment date. But if there's any extenuating circumstances that prevent a learner from completing on time, please contact Green CulturED to extend the enrollment duration. Our certification requires a minimum of twenty (20) total instruction hours and upon completion of each training upon receiving a passing score of seventy percent (70%+) is required in the following subject areas:

- A minimum of five (5) hours of instruction on Washington state laws and rules relating to cannabis to include, but not be limited to, the following topics:
 - Qualifying patient and designated provider cannabis home grow laws.
 - Patient and designated provider cannabis purchase and possession limits.
 - Cannabis product compliance, quality assurance testing, and labeling requirements for recreational and compliant cannabis products, including pesticide labeling.
 - Pesticide use on cannabis products.
 - The medical cannabis authorization process.
- A minimum of two (2) hours on qualifying conditions and the common symptoms.
- A minimum of two (2) hours on the short- and long-term positive and negative effects of cannabinoids.
- A minimum of five (5) hours on products that may benefit qualifying patients based on the patient's condition, any potential contraindications and the risks and benefits of various routes of administration.
- A minimum of two (2) hours on safe handling of cannabis products, including strategies to reduce access by minors.
- A minimum of two (2) hours on ethics and patient privacy and rights.
- A minimum of two (2) hours on the risks and warning signs of overuse, abuse and addiction.

Certification Structure

As part our professional on-demand education, learners may start and stop at any time so anyone completing this certification will have a learner dashboard in the Learning

Management System (LMS) to review training materials at any time. All our online education is created with accessibility in mind, so Green CulturED always meets the American Disability Act (ADA) Section 508 compliance requirements, in addition to other requirements such as W3C, WCAG, HTML5, etc.

If in the future, learners want to review any information, simply log into the LMS to view the learner dashboard to review so it can always be referenced by certified consultants in the future if needed. Here's an overview of how each training module in the certification are developed according to a micro-learning format, so learners will have a consistent experience and intuitively know what's required to complete the certification:

1. Training Videos (Closed-Caption & ADA Section 508 Compliant)

Video-based training ensures learners receive the same information and provides a portable, consistent learning experience that includes Closed-Captioning (CC) to meet accessibility compliance (ex. ADA Section 508, etc.). This is critical for training or anything policy related. Our training videos are animated with motion graphics that are professionally voiced-over along with closed-captioning. To deliver our training videos, an Education-Technology (Ed-Tech) industry standard format is always utilized - called SCORM (Sharable Content Object Reference Model).

This allows for timed slides to ensure minimum training time limits are met and the Learning Management System (LMS) allows learners to log out and resume training where they left off. SCORM is a set of technical standards for online publishing tools, and it is the de facto industry standard for LMS interoperability. Using SCORM packages to deliver the training videos, learners must use the navigation in each video presentation slide to be able to proceed to the next slide in the training.

2. Digital Resources (ADA Section 508 Compliant)

At a minimum, there's always an eBook provided in each micro-learning module (depending on the training materials there may be additional digital resources) since reading is a basic component of most educational activities, providing alternative formats and supports for reading activities becomes necessary to reach all learners, especially for "Accessibility Compliance" (ex. ADA Section 508, etc.) and distance learning. Digital or electronic text offers options such as text-to-speech that provide users additional modalities for receiving the information.

This allows learners to interact with the text to the extent of taking notes, marking, highlighting, drawings, bookmarks, searching, and even interacting with associated

resources. eBooks are text documents that have been converted and published in a digital Adobe PDF format that displays in web browsers to access via mobile devices or computers. eBooks have two (2) basic components, hardware, and software. The hardware, known as a “Reader”, is a special computer-style device or program that displays the book on a screen, and the software contains all the content: text, pictures, and other information.

3. Quiz Activity (ADA Section 508 Compliant)

The applicant must pass the quiz for each micro-learning module with a minimum score of seventy percent (70%). Questions must be randomly selected from a sufficient supply of questions to ensure the validity of the examination. A 70%+ passing grade is required on all assessments to assess learners’ understanding of the training materials in our Learning Management System (LMS), providing a direct measure of how learners are responding to the training topics, and performing as learners. An assessment is placed at the end of each module, and assessments present learners with a series of questions (ex. Multiple-Choice, True-False, etc.) to gauge how well they understood the content.

Assessments are the most practiced knowledge retention technique. By using them, it helps the learner keep track of their own progress and know what they have learned and retained. It also provides Green CulturED with data about how effective our eLearning modules are, and whether it needs improvement. However, a “final exam” isn’t enough: To maximize retention, assessments are conducted often throughout the training, at the end of each micro-learning module in the certification. This way the learning objectives that are being tested have better alignment with training that learners just completed, and this method makes it easier to focus on retention of the specified material as an approach of our micro-learning modules.

4. Certification Completion (70%+ Grade Required)

The Learning Management System (LMS) provides the ability to set completion criteria for learning activities so learners will see check (tick) appears against the activity’s “checkbox” when the learner meets the required completion criterion. After a learner has completed all their training modules - items one through three (1 – 3) mentioned above – that are contained in the Medical Cannabis Consultant Certification then the LMS will instantly issue learners’ certificate of completion and digital badge to provide proof of being certified.

The criterion is based on completing all required training videos and successfully passing each assessment with a 70%+ grade before learners are automatically marked as complete by the LMS. Also, it is a helpful way for learners to be able to track their progress in the training so learners can easily reference a “checklist” of what they have completed so far and what they still need to complete. The completion tracking is also configured to “restrict access” until all the set criteria are completed then a learner is allowed to progress through the rest of the training and have access to the restricted learning activities.

Academic Policies and Procedures

For learners to receive their certificate of completion and digital badge, all examinations must be comprised of at least five (5) questions for each one (1) hour of instruction must be given for each subject and learners must pass with a minimum score of seventy percent (70%+) or better.

Questions are randomly selected from a sufficient supply of questions to ensure the validity of the examination and the Washington Department of Health (DOH) secretary reserves the right to approve or deny individual questions and answers. The final grade for this certification will be based on:

Certification Evaluation

Constructive feedback from learners is a valuable resource for improving the teaching and learning experience. Additional Consultant Information

Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Training (Annual Requirement)

Current certificate requirements for Medical Cannabis Consultants require an initial applicant to obtain a Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) card from a training to receive their certificate from the Washington Department of Health (DOH). Learners will need to complete a separate CPR training since this is outside the scope of this Medical Cannabis Consultant Certification and is not included as part of its covered curriculum.

Continuing Education and Certification Renewal (Annual Requirement)

Medical Cannabis Consultants must renew their certificate every year on the holder's birthday and initial certificates issued within ninety (90) days of the certificate holder's birthday do not expire until the person's next birthday.

Annual Renewal Process

- Prior to the certificate expiration date, courtesy renewal notices are mailed to the address on file so certificate holders must return the renewal notice when renewing their credential. Failure to receive a courtesy renewal notice does not relieve or exempt them from the renewal requirement.
- The certificate holder must attest to completion of annual certification requirements, including current CPR certification.
- Renewal fees are accepted by the Washington Department of Health (DOH) no sooner than ninety (90) days prior to the expiration date.
- **Duplicate Certificate:** A certificate holder may obtain a duplicate certificate by submitting a written request to DOH and paying the fee.
- **Name Changes:** It is the responsibility of each certificate holder to maintain their correct name on file with the DOH. Requests for name changes must be submitted in writing to the DOH along with documentation showing the name was legally changed.
- **Address Changes:** It is the responsibility of each certificate holder to maintain their current address on file with the DOH. Requests for address changes must be made in writing. The mailing address on file with the DOH will be used for mailing all official matters to the certificate holder.

Consultant certifications expire on their birthday each year and a courtesy renewal notice will be mailed to their address on record so learner must keep their address current with the DOH. Learner may renew online prior to expiration through "Secure Access Washington" (<https://secureaccess.wa.gov/myAccess/saw/select.do>), and if their certification has expired, learner will need to either renew by mail or in-person.

Continuing Education (CE) is required every year around the time of renewal and the renewal notice will include the date CE is required by so it's best to start the renewal process early to avoid an expired consultant certificate.

A certificate holder must complete a minimum of the (10) hours of Continuing Education (CE) each year to renew the certificate and two (2) of the ten (10) hours must be the

successful completion of a two (2) hour CE training offered by the DOH. The following training video and quiz is mandated to renew a consultant certification and will count as two (2) of ten (10) CE hours after watching the training video and the quiz are completed.

The remaining eight (8) hours - of the ten (10) Continuing Education (CE) total hours required - may be earned through seminars, lectures, workshops, and professional conferences. CE hours may not be carried over from one reporting period to another and a certificate holder will provide acceptable documentation of completion of continuing education hours upon request of the secretary or a Washington Department of Health (DOH) audit. A certificate holder must maintain records of CE completion for at least four (4) years and will be required to verify by submitting a signed declaration of compliance.

At the DOH secretary's discretion, up to twenty-five percent (25%) of certificate holders may be randomly audited for CE compliance after a credential is renewed. If identified for an audit, it is the certificate holder's responsibility to submit documentation of completed CE activities at the time of the audit. Failure to comply with the audit documentation request or failure to supply acceptable documentation within sixty (60) days may result in licensing action, up to and including suspension or revocation of the certificate.

Tuition Refund Policy
